### **Introduction**

A. A. Zimnyaya and E. F. Zeer (Russia) — developed the theoretical foundations of moral and aesthetic development and the formation of value systems in educational activities.

N. V. Volkova (Ukraine) — researched the integration of aesthetic education and mobile communication as a pedagogical problem.

In Uzbekistan's academic school, this issue is being studied within the framework of moral education, digital learning, aesthetic culture, and innovative pedagogy.

M. U. Khamidova — researched the theory of moral and aesthetic education and the spiritual image of the teacher in the context of pedagogy and special education.

D. Yuldoshev, N. Turakulova — developed methodological foundations for aesthetic education through digital technologies.

Sh. Sharipov — in his work “The Theory of Moral and Aesthetic Education” links aesthetic values to the professional competence of teachers.

Z. Shodiyeva — studied the psychological aspects of moral behavior of youth in Internet and mobile environments.

N. Karimova — analyzed the development of students' moral culture through mobile communication tools.

#### Main Part

##### 1. The essence and pedagogical potential of mobile learning

##### 3. Ways to form moral and aesthetic worldview through mobile learning

3. Integration of aesthetic education — inclusion of art, design, music, color harmony, and visual culture elements into e-learning materials.
4. Moral-psychological training and online projects — using mobile apps to develop empathy, cooperation, and responsibility.
5. Reflective and analytical assignments — encouraging students to express their moral views through mini-essays, blogs, or podcasts.
6. Mobile art and cultural projects — for example, photo projects like “Beauty Around Us” and virtual museum excursions to enhance aesthetic perception.

4. The teacher’s role in shaping moral and aesthetic worldview

In the context of mobile learning, the teacher acts not merely as a transmitter of knowledge but as a moral and aesthetic mentor, who:

- demonstrates ethical communication practices on mobile platforms;
- uses visual and audio materials that enhance students’ aesthetic taste;
- organizes discussions of moral issues observed in social media;
- promotes moral values through personal example.

5. Criteria for assessing the formation of moral and aesthetic worldview

Assessment direction	Key indicators
Moral aspect	Responsibility, conscientiousness, empathy, readiness for cooperation, ethical behavior in online communication.
Aesthetic aspect	Interest in beauty, aesthetic taste, creative expression, cultured speech, and sense of harmony.
Development levels	Low – indifference; Medium – interest; High – conscious participation and commitment to aesthetic values.

International and practical initiatives

Several international projects aim to promote moral and aesthetic values through mobile learning: UNESCO Mobile Learning Week (2009–2024) — annual forum dedicated to developing intercultural tolerance through digital education.

European Association for Mobile Learning (EAMLI) — an international scientific network exploring the ethical and social aspects of mobile learning.

Asian Digital Learning Hub (ADLH) — implements training programs to enhance aesthetic culture in Asian countries.

Digital Education Center of the Republic of Uzbekistan — develops mobile learning applications and programs aimed at improving teachers’ digital and moral culture.

Conclusion

Mobile learning is not only an effective means of gaining knowledge but also a powerful pedagogical platform for developing the moral and aesthetic perfection of an individual. To ensure its effectiveness, it is necessary to:

- design educational content that meets moral and aesthetic requirements;
